# Introduction

The EU-funded CHILD-UP project analyses migrant children's active participation in changing their social and cultural well-being at school, avoiding passive assimilation to existing socio-cultural contexts. It starts with providing a European overview, collecting data, and evaluating children's education and protection. Secondly, CHILD-UP analyses how to support children's own agency in helping changes in their integration conditions and the construction of hybrid identities. To assess children's need and social position, a child-centered approach is adopted. A multimodal method of research was introduced, including participatory observation, interviews, focus groups and surveys. In a direct approach to children, an art-based method was preferred to stimulate children's interest in research and facilitate deeper engagement in autobiographical interviews. A state of art desktop research was also included in the study. The outcomes also had a practical dimension, resulting in a set of live integration laboratories in schools, teaching/learning tools development and teaching apps – storytelling and awareness-raising.

Other interesting information	SPRING will gather, summarise and share the best available research and evidence on the effectiveness, innovation, transferability, sustainability and evaluation methods for integration policies and practice. This evidence will summarise the findings of European Union projects funded under Horizon 2020, AMIF, European Social Fund and Erasmus+, and relevant public and private donors. Summarising this evidence, SPRING will collect, create and
	disseminate the most usable and practical materials, such as examples of good practice, handbooks, pieces of training, templates, databases and contact lists. The SPRING online portal and repository, combined with the consortium's communications task force and social media strategies, will curate the content and form to match the specific profile and needs of these communities of practice which will make the evidence more accessible.
